Bone fracture - Wikipedia A bone fracture may be the result of high force impact or stress, or a minimal trauma injury as a result of certain medical conditions that weaken the bones, such as osteoporosis, osteopenia, bone cancer, or osteogenesis imperfecta, where the fracture is then properly termed a pathologic fracture. A stable fracture is one in which the broken bone is aligned properly and just barely out of place. These are also referred to as non-displaced fractures. An oblique fracture is one in which the breakage occurs on an angle relative to the alignment of the bone. Fractures (Broken Bones) - OrthoInfo - AAOS A fracture is a broken bone. Treatment for a broken bone follows one basic rule: the broken pieces of bone must be put back into position and prevented from moving out of place until they are healed.

Symptoms of a fracture in your tibia can range from bruising. Hip fracture - NHS Hip fractures are cracks or breaks in the top of the thigh bone (femur) close to the hip joint. They're usually caused by a fall * *or an injury to the side of the hip, but may occasionally be caused by a condition, such as cancer, weakening the hip bone.

Hip fracture - Treatment - NHS Hip fractures are usually treated in hospital with surgery. Most people will need surgery to fix the fracture or replace all or part of their hip, ideally on the day they're admitted to hospital or the day after.

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
